Vacancy at New Aberdour

Prior to its meeting on Tuesday 4th February, Presbytery asked for 4 members of the Kirk Session to attend as they were to discuss including 4 additional congregations in the talks about the future of the church in the Fraserburgh area. If you were at church on Sundays 26th January or 2nd February, you would have heard this request being read as a 'citation from Buchan Presbytery'. These congregations are Lonmay and Crimond along with St. Drostans (New Aberdour) and Pitsligo (Rosehearty), all of which are without a minister and have been for some time now. Presbytery agreed that these four congregations be included in the future discussions around ministry provision in the Fraserburgh area. This does not mean that the church in New Aberdour will close and we will 'just be part of Fraserburgh'. It means that we will be sitting round the table with the Fraserburgh congregations, able to have our say, like them, in the future shaping of the church in our communities.

The immediate effect is that like all the congregations in the Fraserburgh area, our Nominating Committee work has to stop until such time as a plan for the area is put in place. Since so far there has been no interest in the vacancy, we will not notice any changes and just continue as we are.

To help the Office-bearers to understand more clearly what all this means, Kenny Sim, Convenor of the Presbytery Congregations Committee will meet with them on 8th April.




Spring
